Membership Survey Results Rank Museum Priorities

This past summer, the Board of the Oxford Museum conducted a research survey to determine what its members thought should be the Museum's main priorities in the coming years. This survey was part of the Board's new emphasis on building a longer term strategic mission and plan for the Museum. The results are now in.

Overwhelmingly, the Board voted to offer more services to members, such as more trips, tours and workshops. Of the respondents, 321 viewed this as the most important of the Museum's priorities, followed by 318 respondents who thought that the Museum should develop stronger partnerships with local businesses in Oxford, and more formally serve as an Oxford "official visitors' center."

Two hundred fifteen respondents then said that the Museum should focus on special exhibit offerings, such as the recent Norman Harrington World War II photograph exhibit. Lastly, 192 of the respondents wanted to refine the permanent exhibit and use new technologies to make more information available about the Museum's exhibits and collection, as well as about Oxford's history.

"The survey results will help us develop programming that reflects our members' top priorities," says Lisa Harrington, president of the Museum. "We will work to strengthen our partnerships and collaborations with the organizations and businesses in Oxford, so that we can help support a vibrant community."

Oxford's Last Counting House

Many of you may wonder what happened to the little white counting house that until recently was located by the marina on Pier Street. And you may wonder what was counted there. In the heyday of oystering, watermen would bring their catch in bushels to be counted. Once the catch was counted, the watermen would be paid by the packing house owner.

This small building was the last counting house in Oxford, but at one time there were many located around the village. The Oxford Museum took on the project of preserving the building several years ago. When the Town Commissioners decided to improve the boat launch area by Schooner's, they agreed to include the counting house in the space being created by the new launch ramp. For now, the counting house is being refurbished and will be brought out for all of us to see in the spring.
